# Zoning Board OK's outdoor seating for 2 restaurants

At its April meeting Wednesday night, the Zoning Board of Adjustment gave Paoletti's Restaurant the final OK for outdoor seating upstairs on the Oak Street side overlooking K-H Founders Park.

Paoletti's now joins the Highlands Smokehouse, which got the OK from the Zoning Board at its March meeting, which means two more restaurants in town will offer patrons more outdoor seating options.

A special use permit (SUP) from the Zoning Board is required for outdoor seating at a restaurant, however the Macon County Fire Marshal determines how many outdoor seats will be allowed at each venue.




# Plateau Pickup does it again

The Highlands School has been a unique educational institution for this community, and frankly, I can't understand why any parent wouldn't want their children to attend this small K-12 school. Our school is one of only a few schools in North Carolina with the 13-grade format. The school has an excellent record of students going on to make outstanding achievements both here in Highlands and across the country.

For a number of years, my

wife Sallie was the art teacher at the school. She shares my views on the Highlands School size and grade structure. Coming from a metropolitan school to the Highlands School years ago, this jewel of a school was a breath of fresh air. Sallie views her tenure at the Highlands School as a high point in her 25-year career as a teacher. Our daughter was a graduate of the school.

Thursday night at the April Town Board meeting, I will ask the commissioners to approve a resolution asking the Macon County Board of Commissioners to reinstate the \$329,000 contract with the LS3P architects order to complete the design phase for

the additions to the Highlands School. The design phase includes two classrooms for a Pre-K program and four classrooms for the regular school program and would also include upgrades to the school's media center.

If the project were to move forward, it would cost around 5 million dollars.

To put that number in a budgetary perspective, the proposed new Franklin High will cost about 120 million dollars and the Highlands project will cost 5 million. As a matter of

comparison and some fairness, the Highlands School improvements would be about 4% of what it will cost to build the new high school, yet about 50% of the Macon County property tax base comes from the Highlands Plateau. It gets down to basic equity of a sort as our children will not attend Franklin High School; nevertheless, I support the building of the new high school.

Sallie and I will be supporting the Highlands School Town Scholarship program again this year. On Honors Day in May, each graduating senior will receive a scholarship to further their education.

We are supporting the scholarship program by entering the Three Rivers Fly Fishing Festival, which will be from May 4th to the 6th. We are sponsoring two teams this year: my son with his wife and Sallie with me. We probably won't win the tournament, but believe me, the family competition will be intense. The women in the family are convinced they will catch the most fish.

All proceeds from the festival go to the Highlands School Town Scholarship fund, so that is why we are participating. I hope others will fish for our students' benefit also. If you don't fish, you can make a contribution or send a \$250 entry fee. Google the Three Rivers Fly Fishing Festival for more information.

# **Spring Home Inspections**

You know it is Spring when the newspapers have inserts and articles on home improvements, house cleaning, exterior care, HVAC maintenance and lawn and garden ideas. It's actually my favorite time of year and we do a "walk about" with our dog, going around the yard to see what perennials are coming up (or what isn't coming back after the cold snap at Christmas), and watching for the hummingbirds to arrive

and to note what other wildlife we are able to see.


It is also a good time to take time to walk about your home and inspect for issues that may have come up over the winter, whether you were here or not. I took the time to go through about 25 home inspections from my files and have made a list of the ten most common items that were issues on the inspections.

1) Wood decay on roof rafters, trim, columns and siding. Several times one or more of these items led to additional decay within the walls and even the sill of the house. Being that we are in a temperate rain forest only accelerates the decay and these can be expensive items if not maintained.

2) Proper operation of windows and doors. "Fogging" of windows is common, but this was about windows and doors not closing completely or securing properly which can lead to water, insect or rodent intrusion. Some times it is a security issue and could become a safety issue if you can't get the window or door open easily.

3) Grading of soil towards the house and erosion around the footings of the house and deck columns causing water to enter crawl spaces and basements. The heavy rains can do major damage if not kept in check, and this can lead to foundation failure or dangerous situations on decks. Don't forget to look at the retaining walls on the properties. If you see water stains on the concrete block or have camel crickets, that is a good indication that you have water intrusion. When checking the grading, make sure it doesn't slope towards the house and that wood siding doesn't touch the ground or mulch. It is also a good time to check any buried gutter drain lines to make sure they are not clogged.

4) Mold is present in the crawl space

you don't locate the source and make sure the water or moisture doesn't return. There are numerous companies that specialize in mold remediation and crawl space encapsulation, which I highly recommend having done.

5) Rodents in the attic, crawl space or living space. If you see droppings or areas of nesting, you need to not only get rid of them, but find the entry point and fix it so that it doesn't happen again. This can include mice, rats, bats, flying squirrels as well as larger animals.

6) Debris on the roof, in the gutters and roof valleys. This can lead to some of the wood decay described in the first item, but it can also cause roof leaks and shorten the life of the roof. If you have moss growing on the roof, there are products and professionals that can take care of this.

7) Light fixtures not working. Usually, the cause is a blown bulb, so it is a good time to check and replace any bulbs that are not working, paying special attention to outdoor lighting.

8) Smoke detectors beeping. It is always prudent to change the batteries and test the detectors on an annual basis. Research indicates that the detectors should be replaced every 10 years. Yes, it's a pain to check the batteries and change them but this is a safety factor for you, your family and your guests. Don't forget the carbon monoxide detector or to change batteries in your remotes for the gas logs.

9) Decking and railings are not secure. At least half of the inspections indicate the deck isn't properly attached to the house and usually there are some flooring boards that are starting to rot. And, many times the railings are not secure which can be a serious safety issue.







the deal falls apart. Also, I see where the final repair ends up costing more than the cost of regular maintenance. It is advised that every 5-10 years you should hire a professional inspector. Many times, the inspector will find something that you were not aware of. At the minimum, take the time to look at your house, note what needs attention and do something about it. I also advise to use materials that hold up to our weather. They may cost more up front, but should save money in maintenance over the years.

Since Paoletti's is in the B1 zone, seating inside or out isn't contingent upon the number of available parking spaces.

According to the Unified Develop-

However, the Highlands Smokehouse is in the B3 district where available parking determines the total number of seats allowed at a restaurant whether inside or outside.

Since the restaurant is expanding its outdoor seating on a deck facing the back parking lot, more parking was required. An adjacent lot will be used for parking. That lot and the current lot will be combined into one parcel with split-zoning because each original lot has different watershed designations

The Smokehouse proposes adding 23 parking spaces on their adjacent lot to serve the 28 additional seats they are requesting

for an additional outside deck.

The Zoning Board issued the SUP with a couple of contingencies. Due to egress safety concerns, the board required the permanent elimination of the illegal parking spot in the right-of-way at the side entrance where patrons park for pick-ups.

Since the restaurant is surrounded by residences, the board also required that there will be no service or music outside on the decks after 10 p.m.

The previous SUP issued the property in 2008 had 11 p.m. the cut off, but since the town has since ruled that all outside noise stop by 10 p.m. that was made a stipulation in the new SUP.

Though the board acknowledged that they have no sway over the NC Dept. of Transportation, members agreed to ask DOT to improve the line of sight to the east between Raoul Road and the Smokehouse by trimming or removing vegetation. - Kim Lewicki

# From Manhattan to London

y latest reads took me to modern-day Manhattan and Victorian-era England, and both drew me in. You'd never know from my accent that I lived my first thirteen years in New York City and Long Island. As an adult, I often traveled there on business and even had a stint of weekly visits for several months.

Because my father introduced me to so many Manhattan sights when I was a child, revisiting them on foot years later made for heartwarming trips down memory lane.

This was during a time when it was safe to walk from Grand Central Station to Bloomingdales and to explore Fifth Avenue and Broadway on my own. These days, I take those trips only through books.

And England? Anyone who reads this column knows I'm an Anglophile and could read book after book set in England without tiring of the setting. That's why the tee-shirt I'm wearing as I write this column is so à propos. It reads, "I'm a bad girl. I read past my bedtime."

# The Cartographers

by Peng Shepherd When I reserved this book at the library, I thought it was a mystery, pure and simple. It is much more than that. Doing a bit of research after I finished reading it, I noted Amazon categorized it not only as a mystery but also as "Paranormal & Urban Fantasy." They've also labeled it as an Editor's Pick for one of the best books in the "Mystery, Thriller & Suspense" category.

The blurb describes it as an "ode to art and science, history and magic—a spectacularly imaginative, modern story about an ancient craft and places still undiscovered." The ancient craft is cartography, the study and practice of making and using maps.

The mystery concerns what else? A map. What's odd is that it's an old gas station map, not an exquisitely drawn old world map. How many of us still have one tucked somewhere in our homes or in a pocket in our cars? What deep, dark secret could a gas station map contain? Author Peng Shepherd has crafted a captivating tale about maps and the places maps can take us. As I did, you may fig-

As I did, you may ngure out who the villain is, but I doubt you'll predict the twists and turns that ensue even after that revelation.

A Curious Beginning by Deanna Raybourn

After falling in love with Raybourn's "Killers of A Certain Age," I searched for her other books, and was delighted to discover she'd written two historical mystery series set in Victorian England. She shifted to a modern day setting without a hitch.

Equally enchanted with this first book in her Veronica Speedwell series. I plan to pick up her Lady Julia Grey mysteries soon. Raybourn is a master at rapid, witty dialogue, no matter the era, and her Victorianera heroine has some of the best lines in the book.

Is it believable that twenty-five-yearold Veronica has traveled the world on her own as a lepidopterist (butterfly collector)? No, but then she is a woman beyond her time. Many mysteries require a willing suspension of disbelief, and I, for one, want to believe in this heroine.

peals for the informal review process.

"We have a total of 2,033 informal reviews after three withdrew," Abby Braswell, Macon County Tax Administrator said on Tuesday afternoon.

The informal review process involves discussing the assessment with a tax assessor and providing any additional information or evidence that may impact the property value. If the property owner is still dissatisfied with the assessment after the informal review, they can file a formal appeal.

"We have nine Board of Equalization and review appeals," said Braswell.

Out of the more than 2,000 appeals submitted to the county, the Highlands City area (within the town limits) accounts for 421 of the appeals.

The majority of appeals for the Highlands area, 293 to be exact, have resulted in a change in value for the property owner. The remaining 128 appeals reported no change in value after the appeal.

The county's Highlands Rural taxing district - the Highlands Township -- which sits just outside of the city limits of Highlands, has seen 346 appeals with 194 resulting in a valuation change and 152 seeing no change.

According to Braswell, some of the changes that resulted in a change in value through the appeals process included added decks, porches, garages, storage, carport, or HVAC to the parcel so some changes were not in the taxpavers favor.

If a property owner submits an appeal of the new valuation to the tax office, and the staff visits the property to find items such as new buildings or improvements that were not noted on the original revaluation, the tax office has to add those items to the property details, which can result in the property valuation being increased when the property owner was actually seeking to have the valuation decreased.

Though 70% of the appeals resulted in property valuation changes, some of those results agreed with property owners resulting in lower property values, but other cases found that the County revaluation's undervalued properties. which resulted in the property value being increased following the appeal.

In addition to the 2.033 appeals received through the informal review process, Braswell reported that the Board of Equalization and Review (the formal review) has had a total of six cases heard for all of Macon County with four of those resulting in no change in value and two reporting a valuation change.

Of the ones that have gone to the Board so far, four were for Highlands-area properties and two from Franklin. Only one of the cases heard from the Highlands area resulted in a valuation change for the property owner.

The formal appeal form requires the property owner to provide evidence to support their claim that the assessed value is incorrect, such as recent property sales in the area • See APPEALS page 19



# Seeing, touching, and hearing the resurrected Jesus

Ken Langsdorf Lutheran Church of the Holy Family



The celebration of Easter – the resurrection of Jesus – continues until Pentecost Day, which is on May 28 this year. Throughout the Season of Easter we study and reflect on Jesus' post-resurrection appearances. Let's consider together one of these appearances of the risen Jesus as John tells about it in his reporting of the Gospel. John 20: 19- 23

19When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." 20After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. 21Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." 22When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. 23If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

John is describing an event from the evening of the first Easter Day. The disciples of Jesus have locked themselves away because they are afraid the leaders and people who crucified Jesus may be after them next. I think they are also horrified and confused about what happened to Jesus. It had to be traumatic to see their Rabbi treated in such a cruel way, tortured and put to death in the most agonizing way. It is no wonder they are afraid and locked away. They may have also been confused. If they were expecting Jesus to be a military Messiah who would raise up a revolution against the Roman oppressors, they were greatly disappointed. With the death of Jesus, all of their hopes and dreams were crushed. Now what?

Do you think they might have felt some guilt too? Afterall, when Jesus, their Rabbi needed them the most, they ran. They abandoned him. Peter, a leader of the disciples, denied even knowing Jesus. I imagine the disciples feeling some guilt about turning away from Jesus when he was taken away.

It is to this setting, with the disciples of Jesus locked away in fear, grief, confusion, and guilt, that Jesus appears. And what are his first words? Jesus says, Peace be with you. Or Shalom. He didn't express any disappointment or anger or wrath. He didn't come seeking revenge on those who killed him. Rather, the resurrected Jesus comes to his disciples with a message of peace and forgiveness.

or an independent appraisal of the property.

Once the appeal is filed, a hearing will be scheduled with the county's Board of Equalization and Review. The board then reviews the evidence presented by both the property owner and the tax assessor's office and makes a decision on the assessment.

If the property owner is still dissatisfied with the decision, they can appeal to the North Carolina Property Tax Commission, and then to the North Carolina court system if necessary.

The property revaluation process in a North Carolina county involves assessing the value of all properties within the county to determine their current market value. This is done periodically, typically every 4-8 years, to ensure that property taxes are based on current market values rather than outdated values. To file an appeal, property owners can mail it or submit one online at https://maconnc.org/ Tax.html. Mailed applications must be postmarked by May 9th. Emailed appeals are also accepted at tallen@maconnc.org.
