November's Town Board wrap-up

Street lights and string lighting the big items

The November Town Board meeting began with the Worksession at 6 p.m and segued to the Town Board meeting at 7 p.m.

During the Public Comment session of the Town Board meeting, Ann Wilson, who lives on the Dillard Road, spoke against the construction of the NC 106 sidewalk along the north side of

d the road.

She said she hadn't been able to speak against it beforehand, but she wanted the board to know that she doesn't want it as planned.

"I don't want a sidewalk in front of my house," she said. "There isn't enough foot traffic to warrant a sidewalk; it will just be used by OEI employees. In addition, my house sits below the road which means water hitting the sidewalk will come into my yard instead of being absorbed. I also have an old crab apple tree I don't want cut down."

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Commissioners Shearl, Higdon and Antoine want to change election method

The MC Board of Commissioners approved a resolution asking state officials to reconsider how commissioners are elected during their November meeting. The measure passed in a 3-2 vote, with commissioners divided on the best steps moving forward.

The resolution, introduced by Commissioner John Shearl, calls for state officials to consider a local bill that would only apply to Macon County. Though during discussion between board members Shearl said the resolution was only to ask state leaders to consider a change - though specifics weren't recommended -- the actual resolution that was approved and forwarded to Senator Kevin Corbin and Rep. Karl Gillespie called for a revision of the county commissioner election system to accommodate two at-large members. Chairman Paul Higdon, who has expressed a years-long interest in this matter, noted previous rejections of the

idea by past boards.

"This has been something I've talked about for a number of years. I've brought it up before previous boards and it was shot down," said Chairman Paul Higdon.

Election for County Commissioners in North Carolina are in November of each even-numbered year and commissioners are elected to either 2-year or 4-year terms.

County elections are held in conjunction with state and federal elections. To be eligible to serve as a county commissioner, you must reside in the county you wish to serve, be a registered voter and be at least 21 years of age.

By law, each county in North Carolina has a board of commissioners. These boards vary in size, term of office, method of election, method of selecting the chairperson, and administrative structure. Beyond those require-• See ELECTION page 22

State bills lingering in the legislature

t the end of November, the North Carolina Gen-Leral Assembly adjourned its long session. There were over 1.500 bills introduced. Our staff and I tried to track bills that could impact Highlands, especially bills dealing with short-term rentals (STRs), land use, housing, zoning, and utility management. We were not alone; the staff of the North Carolina League of Municipalities did the same. The league staff just published a 32-page report on the status of legislation in this past session that could impact towns and cities.

In the upcoming weeks, I will give updates on the status of bills in the league's report. I have read the report and took copious notes concerning various bills.

Let's start with the two bills addressing short-term rentals that were introduced. Both bills were not passed but will most likely be revisited in the short legislative session in the spring of 2024.

Senate Bill 290-Short-Term Rentals would have allowed municipalities to enforce occupancy limits. It would have also required landlords to accurately represent the number of bedrooms in a given rental. Senate Bill

677-Regulation of Short-Term Rentals would have declared that towns and cities could not regulate short-term rentals. The bill would have affirmed the position that STRs are for residential use. It also states that towns could permit STRs to limit the number of occupants and vehicles. There was also a requirement for the owner or their agent to live within 50 miles of the STR.

The Town of Highlands will be monitoring possible STR legislation in the coming year.


Any changes in our STR ordinances will comply with impending state requirements. One major question is whether current STR ordinances that municipalities have passed would be grandfathered with new state preemption legislation.

Another bill of interest was HB 409/SB 374 Regulation of Accessory Dwelling Units. It passed the House but not the Senate. This proposed law would allow accessory dwelling units in all residential zones. The concept behind the bill was to alleviate shortages in workforce housing. The bill could override many existing zoning requirements established by towns, such as setbacks and some building codes. The North Carolina League of Municipalities and mayors like me expressed concerns that without a prohibition against the dwelling units being used as STRs, the intent of providing more workforce housing would be compromised.

Another interesting bill was SB 635-Orphan Roads. Over decades, developers installed nonconforming roads in many developments. These roads are neither state nor town roads. We have several of these private "orphan roads" in Highlands that are in decline and disrepair. Unless homeowner associations do not maintain these roads, no one does. SB 635 stated that if these roads were brought up to state standards by property owners and the contractor doing the work posted a 20% performance bond, the state would take over the roads upon completion of the upgrade. Highlands has a similar policy. The bill failed to pass the State Legislature.


What is amazing to me is how many bills are proposed in a legislative session and how few are actually passed and become law. It is a burdensome process, but such rigor in creating new laws is, in many cases, beneficial.

So, we write these glorious ads, expounding on the positive attributes of homes. I've always thought it would be fun


to do an opposite kind of ad and extol the negative aspects of homes. As a joke, of course!



sidewalk from the post office to Cobb Road on the north side of NC 106 after Shelby Place nixed plans to have it on the south side. Funding will be pursued through grants and construction plans are in the works.

In addition, the Chamber of Commerce's year-long lease was massaged for finalization, Mountain Top Rotary got permission to have its two 2024 shows in KH-Founders Park on Fridays and Saturdays instead of Saturdays and Sundays.

Over the last couple of

months streetlights have caused problems in neighborhoods some people want them and others don't - while putting the town in the middle. This instigated the town adopting a "Town Street Light Policy."

So as of the November Town Board meeting, town-owned and maintained streetlights will be considered primarily in areas that have sidewalks or other pedestrian paths on public streets; though it's happened in the past, the town will no longer place streetlights on private streets; existing town-owned and maintained streetlights on private streets may remain at the discretion of the Town Board or the Town Manager. Complaints from adjoining or adjacent neighbors to the light will determine whether the light stays: streetlight placement on private streets will be the responsibility of the developer in future subdivisions; existing properties may place street lighting on their property at their expense and maintenance; all private lighting must comply with the Town of Highlands Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) Sec. 6.3.3; exterior residential security and

area lighting must be on private property and; approval of all adjacent property owners and/or homeowners associations, if applicable, must be obtained prior to submitting an application for installation of a town streetlight.

A public hearing to change verbiage in the UDO regarding Exterior Commercial Lighting will be held at the Dec. 14 Town Board meeting.

The purpose of the Exterior Commercial Lighting section of the UDO is to provide direction in controlling exterior lighting to enhance the areas being lit and not adversely affect motorists, pedestrians, and adjacent properties.

The changes to the ordinance primarily deal with "string lighting" and the fact that they can only be used as accent lights for dining areas and private property walkways; only allowed over one dining structure like a deck, pavilion, or porch, per commercial parcel and they may not be •See TOWN BOARD page 16





God with us, our only hope

During Advent we wait. Just as Israel longed for Messiah in His first coming, we yearn for His second coming. During Christmas we rejoice that His Light has come into the world and remains with His people. On the first Sunday of Advent, celebrated this past Sunday, we celebrate that God broke in on creation to redeem us through His incarnational birth, life, and death on the cross. It was Augustine who noted that His first coming was in relative obscurity while in the second it will be witnessed by the whole world. He came into obscurity to be judged for our sins, but the next time to be the judge.

We live in a world that marginalizes God more and more. Even in the Church, His body, He appears absent from our lives as we operate out of a prosperity driven selfconfidence, technologically inebriated, and a narcissistic invincibility. God is kept quietly on the margins of our lives. Yet we celebrate Christmas, singing to Immanuel, God with us. But Advent is a time to reflect and revive the need for God to "break in on us" once again and give us HOPE!

Isaiah mourned his day of neglect of God, and it resonates with our own (Isaiah 1:4, 11-18). The people were in deplorable circumstances given that their lives, homes, nation, families, wealth, and governmental stability were all threatened by impending political disasters – in successive waves the Assyrians, Babylonians, and Persians were headed their way to destroy them. Adding to their woes was that their worship of God had been greatly abandoned and worship – when it occurred - was a redundant, mediocre practice of ritual. Liturgy without life. Wells without water. But as the prophet will preach, their hope was in a returning to God and seeking His renewed presence and power among them.

But for that to happen, we like Isaiah will need to repent (Isaiah 6:1-8). Again, Advent begins with the Hope of God once again breaking in on us and restoring His people. It might be hard to believe, but Christmas Hope begins with contrition and repentance. Immanuel, "God with us," starts with heart preparations if we want to witness His throne and presence, and there receive grace, forgiveness, and restoration. This is, after all, the real message of Christmas.

But one more thought. Isaiah then experienced hope for a better day. A day of ultimate deliverance (Isaiah 7:14; 9:6-7; 60:1-3; 65:17-18). The promise of the coming of God into our darkness and despair came with a job description. First, He will take over the governance of the world. Second, He will rule as a wonderful counselor, giving wise guidance to the world. And third, He will rule as the mighty God that He is, as father and regent of peace. And there will be no end. For all the bluster and anger over the political scene today, let us turn to the God who is with us in Christ, for that is our only real hope. Celebrate Christmas, but during the Advent season, repent of those sins that He came to die for the first time, and rejoice in the HOPE we have in a new day coming in His second coming!



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ments, how many and by what method commissioners are elected is largely left up to individual counties. There are no other formal requirements, and there are no limitations on how many terms a commissioner can serve.

The typical county board in North Carolina consists of 5 or 7 commissioners, although some counties have as many as 9. Boards generally meet at least two times per month at the county courthouse or administrative building. Different counties have different methods for electing their county commissioners. Some commissioners are elected at-large, some are elected at-large with residence requirements, while some are nominated and elected by district.

Since 1978, the five-member board in Macon County has been elected from three districts. District one comprises Ellijay, Flats, Highlands, and Sugarfork, with one member elected.

District three includes Burningtown, Cartoogechaye, Cowee, and Nantahala, also electing one member.

District two encompasses Iotla, Millshoal, North Franklin, East Franklin, South Franklin, Union, and Smithbridge, electing three members with staggered terms.

This structure allows potential candidates from District two to file for election every two years. while candidates from singlemember Districts one and three can only file every four years.

For example, if John Smith runs for the county board of commissioner in District two and loses, he can run again in another two years, however if Jane Doe runs for the county board of commissioners in District three or District one and loses, she cannot run again for four years.

"In order to provide equal opportunity to all eligible citizens of Macon County to run for commissioner every two years, the Macon County Board of Commissioners believes that the best method would be for the election of one member from each of the three districts, with two at-large members with staggered terms,"

the resolution reads.

North Carolina allows the composition of the board to be changed by one of two ways. The method Shearl proposed was to petition state representatives to change the board via a local bill through the North Carolina General Assembly.

The other option would be for the board to pass a resolution to call a special referendum on the question of adoption of the alterations. The referendum would be held and conducted by the county Board of Elections.

Macon County Commissioner Gary Shields said that he didn't see a need to change the way the county has operated for the last 45 years therefore he didn't support the resolution. Commissioner Josh Young said he agreed with the desire to ensure the elections are fair, however he did not want to see a change without first seeking public input.

"Before we print a bill and sign it to Raleigh, I feel like it's my duty to at least ask for public involvement and get consideration from the public before I pass this thing," said Young. "I do see where you're going, and I do like that. So, I want to make sure it's clear I'm not trying to run off the rails here, but I feel like I want to really go through this."

Commissioner Shearl advocated for the resolution arguing that the current method is unfair. however, despite an individual being able to run for office every two vears currently, there is no instance of that happening in recent historv in Macon County.

The Jackson County Board of Commissioners consists of five members elected for staggered, 4-year terms. Each Commissioner is elected county-wide, but must reside within the boundaries of one of the four districts. One Commissioner is elected for each district, with the exception of the Chairman.

In Haywood County, Commissioners are elected to serve

four-year staggered terms. All five commissioners are elected atlarge. Commissioners take office four weeks after they are elected in general elections every two vears, on the first Tuesday in November.

In Clay County, there are five elected Commissioners. Each are elected at-large with residence requirements. All county commissioners are elected at the same time as members of the General Assembly and other state officers. which take place in elections held in the month of November in even-numbered vears. Because the board members have staggered four-year terms and twovear terms, two of the county commissioners are elected at each general election.

The Graham County board consists of five members who are elected at-large on a partisan basis.
