The future of the Macon County Board of Health could be decided at the next meeting of the MC Board of Commissioners after a public hearing set for Sept. 9 at 6 p.m. in the courthouse.

After several months of discussion among commissioners, the board of health and health department employees, commissioners will hold a public hearing for consideration of assuming powers and duties of the board of health.

Commissioners approved the public hearing at the July 8, meeting of the board and published the notice as required.

In July, after receiving numerous complaints from the

#### A recap of worksession and TB meeting

would like to provide updates on the three meetings that took place last week. The meetings were the Mirror Lake Improvement Association, the Town workshop about the playhouse, and the monthly meeting of the board of commissioners.

The Mirror Lake meeting was very well-attended, and attendees asked numerous questions. Members of a panel consisting of the association, the Town, River Sand, and McGill Engineering Associates responded.

Several questions centered around when all the equipment will be removed from Mirror Lake. River Sand is in the final stages of phase one dredging. Even when they finish and remove equipment like the big orange excavator, Mirror Lake will not be free from equipment any time soon.

Phase One is about 10% of the total dredging plan. In the coming months, the contractor who gets the contract for the remaining phases will have a substantial amount of equipment on and around the lake.



The remaining phases will involve the spending of the five million dollars that the state allocated for dredging. Much more silt will be removed in these next phases more equipment will be needed. Additionally, these phases will occur over a significantly longer period.

Another question expressed frustration that the funds for dredging have not been proportionally distributed to all homeowners with lake frontage. That proportional funding has not occurred.

is correct, proportional funding has not occurred. The plan submitted to the state did not include a proportional formula; instead, it focused on dredging portions of the lake that could be dredged. It also emphasized that the project would preserve water quality for the plateau watershed.

The second meeting was the town workshop to gather citizen feedback about the future of the Highlands Playhouse. One citizen attended and suggested an alternative use for the building. Another person suggested an idea about how to repurpose the property. Board members were surprised at the almost complete lack of response to the workshop session.

A final decision about the playhouse will be on the agenda of the September Town Board meeting. Commissioners remain open to feedback regarding the building and property. At the regular board meeting, the board voted to have a survey done of the entire property where the playhouse, police station, ABC store, Macon County EMS, and Town Hall are located. The old Kelsey Map needs updating. Also, the deed to the playhouse property prohibits leasing that space for commercial use, such as a taproom or restaurant.

During the subsequent Town Board meeting, the first item of discussion was how the board should fill a vacant position due to a resignation or death. There is no official town policy in the town charter or ordinances. The state allows the local elected body to decide how to fill an open seat. If the vacancy occurs close to a municipal election, but not within 90 days, the voters can make the decision, as is being done now with Brian Stiehler's open seat.

The board also reviewed the alcohol policy for public spaces and events. Our town attorney is revising the forms and procedures

In 2017, Mission Health System honored him with the "Leading by Example" award which is a leadership award covering all of the Mission Hospitals.


The administration continues adding titles to his name with the latest being Project Manager.

#### **Kenneth Wayne McKim**

Kenneth Wayne McKim, 78, went to his heavenly home August 9, 2025. He died suddenly of a heart event after returning from a beautiful, inspirational Greek islands cruise.

Kenneth was born on April 15th, 1947, in Nacogdoches, Texas to loving, supportive parents: Major Miller and Helen Maxine McKim. He had one sister, Linda Alice Leathers of Richland Hills, Texas, who survive him.

Kenneth grew up in Paris, TX, where his dad owned a trucking company. He credited his dad with many things, but especially, that he taught him to work. He was sweeping the trucking docks at 12 and graduated to hostling trailers on

trucking docks at 12 and graduated to hostling trailers on the yard and then learned the office work. He drove huge trucks with multiple trailers as he worked for major carriers in his career. After driving more than a million miles in every kind of weather, he retired from Yellow Freight Lines in 2004. While tarping a large 18-wheel type trailer, he fell and suffered injuries to his ankles, but people seldom knew it. The pain did not keep him from fulfilling his responsibilities.

Kenneth was somewhat a Paris local hero as he was a stand-out basketball player, football player and an accomplished water skier. Boating, ski competitions and ski shows filled the summers of his teen years. He was in the Century Club of the American Water Ski Association for jumping over 100 feet when that was exceptional.

As a member of the Paris Boat and Ski Club, he helped maintain the slalom course, ski jump, docks, boat ramps and all. He barefooted, flew the kite behind the boat (not a Delta wing) and performed a doubles act with the girl who was to become his wife, Julie. As they skied, she would climb to his shoulders and do stunts as he kept them stable as the boat ran its course. Cypress Gardens wanted to hire him, but he declined.

Kenneth graduated from Paris High School and attended East Texas A&M and Dallas Baptist University. He taught at a Dallas elementary school for a time. Kenneth married Julie in 1966. When her family moved to Paris and began spending summers at the lake, he wanted to meet her. As an expert skier, he frequently would ski up to shore and walk out of his skis. Wanting to impress, he tripped. He would say that he fell head over heels for her.

As God added children to their home, Kenneth developed a conviction that he should have as many children as God would send and rear them to glorify God.

In 1985, although their children were excelling academically and in sports, Kenneth felt convicted to homeschool his children. Kenneth taught the Bible and oversaw other

subjects. At about the same time, Kenneth and Julie established a non-profit ministry, Family Heritage. Through seminars, the goal was to educate and encourage parents to build lives and relationships on Biblical principles. # **Breaking fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention**

Dear Editor.

Let it be known to all in our community and plateau of Highlands, NC that the First Baptist Church of Highlands is breaking ties and fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention, effective August 13, 2025.

Significant documentation confirms what we as a congregation have come to know and now condemn as institutional. ethical, and financial failures of the Southern Baptist Convention. It is with heavy hearts vet firm convictions that we leave the Convention after nearly 130 years of cooperation with its great agendas of the past regarding missions and evangelism. However, we will remain Baptist in our ecclesial polity and doctrinal distinctives. We remain firmly rooted in our historical faith and practices supported by our affirmation of the historic creeds and confessions that have and will continue to guide us - the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed, and the 1689 Baptist Confession of Faith. These and the wisdom of the past from our fathers and mothers in the Lord will sustain us as we attempt to be a devoted and sanctified people for the Lord Jesus Christ, awaiting His Second Coming.

The issues, in brief, that led to our disappointment with the SBC as it now operates are generally three-fold (though other minor indiscretions could be enumerated).

First, as widely reported and affirmed by an independent investigation of Guidepost Solutions, there has been an intentional concealment of sexual abuse occurring in SBC churches and even the Convention leadership itself. For two decades, over 700 survivors of abuse have contacted the SBC and its executive committee to report abuses only to be met with resistance, even hostility. The leadership's goal was to control and guard the information and avoid liability for the Convention. They hid behind the weak refrain they could not involve themselves due to the polity of local church autonomy – even if this meant that the accused were allowed to continue in ministry elsewhere and no warning to the unsuspecting churches. Power, prestige, and financial considerations usurped clear, ethical demands to expeditiously address these transgressions that harmed so many.

Second, this coverup has caused the SBC to spend considerable amounts of money to cover the expenses of the Guidepost Solutions report, legal fees, and establishment of "abuse centers" - to name a few egregious expenditures. This has led to an estimated \$12.1 million spent by the SBC Executive Committee – money given faithfully by the churches to support the Convention for other ministry needs. The SBC is selling its building in Nashville and seeking additional funds to cover anticipated expenses. Because of the incongruencies across the board of the SBC and mission entities, transparency of financial expenditures was rejected at the annual meeting in 2024, being blocked in commit-

tee. As it turns out, the SBC does not meet the minimal standards for nonprofit institutions with an audit of such expenditures as executive salaries, real estate, and so forth. We at First Baptist Church see this as an abuse of power and loss of proper stewardship of God's Kingdom work, and a waste of the sacrificial giving of many church members.

Third, the adoption of and eventual failure to rescind Resolution 9 (2019, 2021). This resolution advocates for the use of CRT ("Critical Race Theory") – a secular and politicized worldview – as an analytical tool in Biblical-based ministry to evaluate human experiences. Despite it clearly being rejected in many academic and theological circles, the SBC maintains its validity. We at First Baptist Church see this as a compromise shift more congruent with Neo-Marxist ideology of the "woke" movement and nomenclature of

todav's progressivism.

Because of these and other multiple lesser indiscretions, we at First Baptist Church Highlands declare our disassociation from the Southern Baptist Convention. If in the future the SBC leadership repents of these failures and heartily moves to rectify them, we would consider reuniting with those churches. In the meantime, our church will continue to utilize funds once appointed to the SBC and its mission entities and convey them to other worthy mission causes that spread the Gospel and serve the needy. Time is short, and we at First Baptist Church Highlands seek to be good stewards of the resources entrusted to us.







The Highlands Highlanders are off to a busy and exciting start to their fall sports season, with both middle school and high school teams showcasing their skills on the field and court.


#### Middle School Boys Soccer

#### A Day with the Wylers: Legacy, Craft, and a Vespa Ride Through Rome

Some films live in the culture like old friends — familiar enough to quote yet layered enough to surprise on every return. Roman Holiday is one of them. On Friday, Sept. 19, the Highlands-Cashiers Film Festival offers audiences a rare chance to see it as part of a day shaped around the life and work of its director, William Wyler.

The morning begins at 9AM with Directed by William Wyler, a documentary that steps beyond the filmography to consider the man himself. Told through archival material and conversations with collaborators, the portrait that emerges is one of precision and persistence: a filmmaker equally at home in the grandeur of Ben-Hur and the quiet tensions of The Best Years of Our Lives. The film doesn't just catalog achievements — it traces the evolution of an artist navigating changing eras, technologies, and tastes without losing his own sense of truth.

Two hours later, the focus shifts from the sweep of a career to the intimacy of a single work. Catherine Wyler, the director's daughter, will introduce a full screening of Roman Holiday, offering her own perspective on the production that launched Audrey Hepburn into stardom and paired her with Gregory Peck in one of cinema's most enduring duets.

The film is often remembered for its charm — the chaotic Vespa ride through postwar Rome, the sly exchanges, the bittersweet farewell — but Wyler's direction gives it something harder to pin down: a sense that these characters live beyond the frame. Catherine's presence in Highlands bridges the distance between what we see and how it was made. She understands her father's discipline and instincts not only as his daughter, but as a film professional who has navigated the industry herself.

Experiencing the documentary and the feature back-to-back reveals the connective tissue between them: the meticulous preparation, the commitment to casting, the willingness to let silences speak as loudly as dialogue. It's a pairing that turns a festival day into a kind of master class — not in the technicalities of filmmaking alone, but in the artistry of storytelling that endures.

And the day doesn't end there. Sept. 19 continues with additional screenings and conversations across the festival, culminating in the Bogart Cocktail Party — a nod to Hollywood's golden age that invites guests to swap the theater seat for an evening drink and good company. Taken together, the schedule offers something rare: a full day in which Highlands becomes both a cinema and a salon, a place where stories are told on screen and extended in conversation long after the credits roll.

to present a plan – how to fund the "renovation" and what the use would be.

"I'm disappointed it's not standing room only, tonight," said Commissioner John Dotson.

Mayor Pat Taylor said someone had suggested preserving the façade somehow and using it somewhere and saving the seats. There was also talk about a National Historic Preservation Society stepping in, he said.

Following the two suggestions from people in the audience, Commissioner Dotson said to bring a plan to the September Town Board meeting.

"But it needs to be a plan that is fully funded and decisive," he said.

During the following Town Board meeting, commissioners voted to have the Town property surveyed – the property that encompasses the Town Hall, the Police Station, the Playhouse the ABC store, and the Macon County EMS buildings.

#### Resignation of commissioners

With Commissioner Brian Stiehler's resignation, the mayor asked the board to think about initiating a policy regarding future vacancies on the Town Board when they aren't covered by state statute. The board said situations not covered by statute

could be discussed as they come up.

#### Alcohol use in the park

Allowing people to drink alcohol during fourth of July activities in KH Founders Park is still undecided. Commissioner Amy Patterson still believes it shouldn't be allowed due drunkenness, even though Police Chief Andrea Holland said there have never been issues at any music event in the park or previous July 4 festivities.

Though the town allows alcohol at the Saturday music events in the park, it hasn't allowed alcohol in the park on Fourth of July, something the police say is not enforceable because there are too many people.

"If it's unenforceable, why are we trying to enforce something that is unenforceable?" asked Commissioner Dotson.

Even though there weren't any problems, Captain Leah McCall said that given the size of the crowd in the park for the fireworks, more than the usual two officers should be present.

No decision was made, but the board reviewed the alcohol policy for public spaces and events drawn up by the Town Attorney. Responsible parties who serve or allow alcohol will have to fill out the permit

general public as well as health department employees, commissioners held a joint meeting with the board of health. Chairman Josh Young wanted to give the health board a chance to talk face-to-face about the issues and complaints.

For several months, commissioners have fielded complaints about the health department, so many that Young described it as "overwhelming." The complaints have ranged from low morale to concerns about the Health Director Kathy McGaha. Some of the complaints stated the work atmosphere was "toxic." Issues expressed from the general public include problems with animal control and environmental health, specifically the backlog of permitting.

Health Board Chair Jerry Hermanson introduced the 11 members of the health board to the commissioners – eight are designated health professionals and three members are from the general public as required by state law.

It quickly became evident that there was a communication issue between the two boards. In addition, several of the health board members are new and still learning their role on the board. Many members of the health board also expressed their concern that they were unaware of any problems with the health department and were hearing about the complaints for the first time at the joint meeting.

Even though some of the health board members urged commissioners to reconsider due to the new members and because the health board members were unaware of the complaints, commissioners unanimously voted to take over of the health board. A law enacted by North Carolina in 2012 allows the board to have authority over the health department.

Two meetings of the Health Board took followed – a special meeting at which no action was taken and the regular meeting during which Dr. Charlie Vargas and Health Board Chair Jerry Hermanson got upset and left the meeting and building, subsequently resigning from the board of health.

Liaisons to the health board, Commissioners John Shearl and Barry Breedan, have expressed their concerns about the health department saying they would like the board of health to be an advisory board to the elected commissioners who would be in charge of the department.



#### Why do **Catholics Honor** Marv?

n dialoguing with non-Catholics, I often receive questions about Mary and why Catholics pay her so much Lattention. One thing is clear: many misunderstandings abound. With this column, I simply wish to offer how Catholics understand the mother of Jesus.

Firstly, Catholics do not worship Mary – adoration belongs to God alone and to adore a creature would constitute idolatry. Any reverence given to Mary reflects veneration of her and ultimately of the gifts God gave her.

Catholics see Mary as fulfilling numerous important roles in the Old Testament. For instance, as St. Paul describes Jesus as the "New Adam" (Rom 5), so church fathers have described Mary as the New Eve since the time of St. Irenaeus around 180AD: "...the knot of Eve's disobedience was loosed by the obedience of Mary." As Eve was "the mother of all the living," (Gen 3:20), so the New Eve is the mother of all those living in Christ, that is "those who keep the commandments of God and bear testimony to Jesus" (Rev 12:17).

Mary is also considered the Ark of the New Covenant, which was the most sacred and venerated object of Israel and where God "overshadowed" (Ex 40:34; Lk 1:35) and dwelt with His people. St. Luke compares Mary's visitation to Elizabeth (Lk 1) with the ark entering Jerusalem (2) Sam 6). Both remain for "three months," David and John the Baptist "leaped," and both David and Elizabeth asked, "how is it that the ark/mother of my Lord should come to me?" John, likewise, describes the ark, now in heaven, as "a woman, clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet, with a crown of twelve stars (Rev 11:19-12:1).

Catholics also see this "crown" as reflecting Mary's fulfillment of the Old Testament kingdom's "Queen Mother" first established by Solomon when he enthroned his mother, Bathsheba, and gave her the role of intercessor, saying: "Make your request, my mother; for I will not refuse you." The Queen Mother title and office continues to be seen throughout the books of Kings. It is no surprise, then, that the establishment of the Kingdom of God (as the reestablishment and fulfillment of the OT kingdom) would see the mother of the King as Queen Mother. Christ even refuses to deny His mother at Cana as she intercedes for the wedding guests.

Some see attention given to Mary as distracting from Jesus. I personally do not see them in competition. If "it is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me" (Gal 2:20), then when I look to God in heaven, I can truly say "Our Father," and likewise see Mary as my mother.

Upon its completion, the new OLM church on 5th Street will have inscribed above its front doors the penultimate words said by our dying Lord on the cross as He looked upon His mother and the disciple whom He loved: "behold thy mother" (Jn 19:27).

for granting permission to serve alcohol. Those forms will be completed soon for organizations that wish to serve or sell alcohol at public events, such as those held in Founders Park

The board also conducted a first review of the recent audit and federal Form 990 of the Highlands Chamber and Visit Highlands. Over 1.4 million dollars in room occupancy tax is reflected in the documents that the board received. I appreciate the chamber sharing this information with the board and call upon them to share any such financial information that they send to the county each year. This financial information will be reviewed and discussed again by the board at a future workshop session.

At the meeting, I also called for the county to review the 1985 legislation that established the TDA system in Macon County. I believe a revision of this legislation is long overdue. Most counties in the state have already made such revisions that are allowed by law. The revisions provided more flexibility in how TDA funds can be used. A basic upgrade to the enabling legislation would eliminate any legal concern about whether TDA tax dollars can be used to clean and maintain visitor restrooms in the business district.
