# Animal control changes in the works

Since the beginning of the year, the Macon County Board of Commissioners has struggled with the issue of how to fix problems with the Macon County Animal Services. For the last few years, the department has faced many challenges including understaffing, undersized and inadequate facilities and the need for additional funding.

The public has shown up for several board meetings expressing concerns ranging from animals not being taken care of properly at the shelter to problems with animals in the county not being addressed, often due to lack of staff.

At the request of the board, County Manager Warren Cabe was tasked to work on a feasibility study exploring options for

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## The race begins for Highlands' election

Mayor seat and three commissioner seats are open; write-ins could decide the election

The ballot for the Highlands municipal election is sparse this time around – the incumbents Mayor Pat Taylor, and Commissioners Amy Patterson and Eric Pierson are the only candidates who signed up to run.

However, with two years left on Brian Stiehler's unexpired term, Jim Tate, who served as Highlands' representative on the MC Board of Commission for 11 years, who retired from the Highlands Fire & Rescue Dept. after 20 years and who has served on both Highlands Planning and Zoning boards as well as the HC Land Trust board, is running for that seat.

Having served for 12 years, incumbent Mayor Pat Taylor is running for a fourth term.

Commissioner Patterson was elected November 1989 for her first four-year term, which began 1990. She took two years off and has been on the board consistently since then and has so far served a total 33 years. She is running for another four-year term.

Pierson was on the board for two consecutive terms; came off for two years; was elected again and is now running for a fourth term.

Based on the number of Town of Highlands registered voters – 986 – and the number who turn out to vote, apathy has clearly set in concerning Highlands' elections.

The number who voted in the 2021 municipal election was 496; the number who voted in the 2023 municipal election was 423.

However, there is "talk" of a grassroots write-in campaign taking place to get some new faces on the board.

In NC, people don't have to register or file a petition to be a write-in candidate in a non-partisan municipal election. As long as

hursday, October 16, is the Highlands Town Board of Commissioners workshop and then board meeting. Both sessions are at the Highlands Community Building next to the ball field. The workshop meeting starts at 6 p.m., followed by the board meeting at 7 p.m. Both meetings can be viewed remotely via the town's YouTube portal on the town website.

The workshop agenda will have two parts. The first will be a presentation by the town staff and the police department on installing more security cameras on Main Street, followed by a discussion. These cameras would not have public access like the current one on Main Street. They would increase security against criminal actions, such as the recent smash-and-grab at a Main Street store and enforce ordinances about merchandising on town streets.

The second workshop item will be a closed session with the attorney representing the town in the Huff vs Highlands law-

The board meeting has a full agenda, starting with a presentation of a memorandum of understanding between the town and the Plateau Boys and Girls Club. The MOU will outline the procedures to move forward with the construction and operation of a new Boys and Girls Club on the campus

of the Highlands Recreation Department. A committee of town and Boys and Girls Club representatives has been meeting for several weeks to develop the MOU. This agreement is the critical first step in moving the project forward.

A second agenda item will be to review a proposed new ordinance concerning solicitation and merchandising on town streets and property. The town attorney drafted this ordinance. An initial draft was reviewed at last month's town workshop. Now that this draft is on the board's agenda tonight, a final action at this meeting is very much possible. How the new ordinance will be enforced will be a part of the discussion leading up to final approval.

The Highlands Neighborhood Coalition has been conducting a citizen survey in the past several weeks. Representatives from the coalition will be presenting the survey and findings to the Town Board at tonight's meeting.

Matt Shuler from our GIS and IT department will present an update on the development of an electric system outage map. Matt and the electric department have been developing this map for several months. With board approval, they will be ready to put the outage map on the town website. The website can be accessed directly or through the town app.

The map design will show in red any area that has lost power protection during an extreme weather event or at any time. Hopefully, such a system will cut down on the surge in calls reporting power outages during storms. Also, our electric crews will use the map to pinpoint the exact locations in town where power is out.

Finally, Fire Chief Gearhart will appear before the board to request approval


#### A bird on a mission

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

animal services. One possible suggestion is to find an outside agency to manage the animal shelter.

Several months ago, the county issued a RFP (request for proposal) seeking outside agencies who may be interested in assuming control of animal services. Cabe said the county received one proposal from a nonprofit agency who currently works with the shelter and is interested in taking over animal services.

At this week's BOC meeting, Meg Kremer, an active volunteer and president of Pawsitive Shelter Volunteers (PSV) doing business as Humane Society of WNC, presented a proposal to commissioners for PSV to assume control over animal services. PSV is proposing a streamlined, outcome-oriented model for animal shelter services in Macon County. Their proposal addressed three core areas – animal intake,

## Come, join a No Kings rally Saturday, Oct 18 in Sylva (11a) or Highlands (12:30p)

Dear Editor.

Good reason to rally for democracy: Congressional Republicans insist that the government shutdown lies with the Democrats. Briefly, the Dems are only trying to retain health care subsidies and access to Medicaid due to expire in December. Republicans are clear that health care cuts are non-negotiable (AI overview; search on "Medicaid cuts non-negotiable"). NC has already announced plans to cut Medicaid payments ((KFF Health News; kffhealthnews. org) as a result of the Republicans Big Beautiful Bill. But, according to numerous polls, most Americans want to retain the subsidies, and are supporting the shutdown in hopes the Republicans will come to their senses. If affordable health care is not on your radar, here is another reason to rally.

In September, under orders from the President and without warning, the military in the Caribbean began lethally destroying boats supposedly smuggling drugs from Venezuela. Not once has the government suggested any credible evidence exists that these boats are smuggling drugs, or even Venezuelan. Because destroying boats in international waters with no warning can be considered an act of war, the Department of Justice retroactively provided a classified legal basis for these attacks – that the boats' occupants were terrorists associated with drug cartels set on destroying America. Smugglers are considered criminals, subject to due process. Terrorists have no rights to due process.

Then, on September 22, Trump issued an Executive Order designating Antifa as a domestic terrorist

organization. Antifa – which stands for Anti-Fascism – is not an organization; it was originally an identifier of farleft protestors and has morphed to a very broad catch-all phrase for people protesting US Government actions. Again, terrorists have no rights to due process.

Horrifyingly, Trump told military leadership on Sept 30 (YouTube) "We're under invasion from within. No different that a foreign enemy but more difficult ... because they don't wear uniforms." He also suggested the military train in "dangerous" American cities. He has identified Chicago and Portland, at least, as dangerous cities.

Finally, on October 5, Attorney General Bondi said "We're going to take the same approach [as towards drug cartels] with Antifa: destroy the entire organization from top to bottom. We're going to take them apart. Thanks to ... the designation of Antifa as a <u>terrorist</u> organization—which is exactly what they are—Americans will no longer tolerate their unhinged violence." Attorneys and others say that taken together, the Executive Order and Trump and Bondi's comments can be interpreted to mean that the US military has permission to kill civilians. (Google Bondi's quote; reporting from various news organizations).

Last week Stephen Miller called the No Kings rallies "stupid old hippies." On Friday Mike Johnson recharacterized us as "antifa terrorists who hate America." We really are citizens who believe in the rule of law and think America is worth saving. See you next Saturday.

## Democrats are taking a stand on healthcare for all Americans

Dear Editor,

Western North Carolina is facing a critical situation in health care, and Congress is making it worse. Republicans claim their budget is "clean," but a closer look reveals it is filled with cuts to essential health protections that many of us rely on. Promises to address these issues later do little to help, especially with open enrollment about to begin for state employees (October 13–31) and ACA marketplace plans (November 1–January 15). That is why Democrats are standing their ground.

Here are the facts: As of October 2025, Medicaid covers 3.1 million North Carolinians, including about 440,000 in rural areas and nearly half the children in some counties. Communities like Haywood, Macon, Jackson, Buncombe, and Henderson depend on Medicaid to keep children, seniors, and individuals with disabilities healthy. This month, the North Carolina legislature made matters worse by failing to fully fund Medicaid, triggering immediate and significant provider cuts across the state as of October 1, 2025 - leaving individuals without necessary doctor visits, prescriptions, or vital support.

The impact extends beyond Medicaid recipients. If Congress allows enhanced ACA tax credits to expire, many North Carolinians could see their insurance premiums more than double, according to Kaiser and state data. This situation does not just affect families; small business owners,

farmers, and self-employed individuals—who make up a significant portion of our area—could lose coverage or face exorbitant premium increases. Small businesses and gig workers might see their monthly costs rise by hundreds of dollars, forcing some to forgo insurance entirely.

Teachers, state workers, and retirees will also be affected. Approximately 750,000 people, including many public school employees, are facing increased health plan costs, higher copays, and potential gaps in care due to state budget challenges. Retirees living on fixed incomes may experience soaring premiums, jeopardizing their coverage and depleting their savings.

Open enrollment is the only opportunity for most people to ensure they have coverage – there is no "fix it later" for these families or groups. If Congress does not act swiftly, many will be left with higher bills, reduced care, or no insurance at all until next year.

This is why Democrats are taking a stand. Health care for working families, business owners, teachers, retirees, and everyone in our rural communities is far more important than providing new tax breaks for billionaires. Our region cannot afford business as usual. Congress must protect Medicaid and ACA coverage now, before anyone gets left behind.

animal husbandry and animal service pro-

PSV's mission for animal services would be to maintain a safe, sanitary and humane environment for every animal while optimizing flow and accelerating live outcomes. One future goal of the organization if they assume control would to eventually become a "no

"I think this could be a winning formula for Macon County - the animals, the volunteers, employees and owners," said Kremer. "We want to do the right thing by the animals that come into our care."

She said one of the key components that they bring is their experience.

"Pawsitive volunteers have been side by side, boots on the ground, with the employees at the shelter on a daily basis caring for the animals," she said. "All our volunteers bring special gifts to the table in terms of their contributions whether its socializing, walking, caring for the dogs, helping to clean and feed the animals, especially when the shelter is always short staffed."

She said knowing how the shelter currently runs, enables them to bring to the table some very good ideas on how to improve the function and efficiency of the shelter for future use.

"I look at it as a collaborative effort between the county and PSV," said Kremer.

Kremer, believes, moving forward the first thing that would have to happen in terms of management would be to have animal control put back under the jurisdiction of

the sheriff's office. Historically, animal control has been under the sheriff's office, but in 2015 the county changed its animal control operations to shift control from the sheriff's office to public health. Due to concerns over the rabies vaccination process, this was considered the best solution at that time.

Kremer said the animal control officers need the legal backing of the sheriff's office.

"I would like to sit down with my liaisons to discuss this," said MC Sheriff Brent Holbrooks. "First and foremost, there is not a general statute in place that would compel me to take over animal control."

If animal control was to be put under the control of the sheriff's office, Kremer is proposing it be separate from animal services. The proposal would call for the construction of a separate wing with a coded lock for only animal control officers and employees after they are briefed on the animal. The sheriff's office would only handle animal control issues with PSV taking care of all the other services of the shelter such as housing, care of the animals and adoption.

Before the organization takes over animal services, commissioners have to work out the details including developing a contract. Cabe said it could take up to 90 days to take care of business before PSV could assume control if this is what commissioners decide is the best option.



The early voting site in Franklin is in the Macon County Community Building, 1288 Georgia Road, Franklin across from Ingles.

Like in Highlands, the polls open at 8a and close at 6p, Monday through Friday. Early voting will continue until Nov. 1 with Saturday polls open from 8a to 3p.

Absentee ballots are still available by request from the Macon County Board of Elections at (828) 349-2034 or at voteby-mail.ncsbe.gov through Oct. 21. Eligible voters who aren't registered can register during early voting with proof of residency and can cast their ballot on the same day.

This year registered voters will need to

show a photo ID to cast their vote. Those who don't have a photo ID can get one for free from the Macon County Board of Elections at the courthouse in Franklin.

Also new this year will be the presence of "observers" inside the polling place.

On Oct. 1, 2025, the NC State Board of Elections revised its "observation rules" to allow parties to appoint observers for a

nonpartisan race, such as a municipal or judicial contest, if a candidate in that race is registered with their party.

The NCSBE decision was driven by the increasing number of municipal elections, many of which are officially nonpartisan, and the interpretation that the 2023 law did not bar observers in these cases.

## **Virginia Allyne Johnson Worley**

Virginia Allyne Johnson Worley died on October 10, 2025. She was born August 22, 1929, in Nashville, TN. Her parents were Oscar Theodore Johnson and Ruth Mebane Johnson. She grew up in Miami, FL: and graduated summa cum laude in 1950 with a major in music from Barry University in Miami. That year, she married Richard Lee Worley

of Miami, a graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point, NY.

In 1964, the family moved to Highlands, NC. Mrs. Worley opened a kindergarten in the Episcopal Church. Two years later, Macon County was awarded a federal grant to establish Head Start pre-schools throughout the county. Mrs. Worley was hired as the teacher at the Highlands center located at that time in the log cabin now occupied by the Highlands Hiker.

A few years later, the state of North Carolina established kindergarten classes in all public schools. Mrs. Worley obtained her teacher's certificate from Western Carolina University and was employed at Highlands School. She retired in 1991. The Highlander Newspaper printed her picture on the front page with the caption, "Beloved Kindergarten Teacher Retires."



Mrs. Worley loved to travel and continue learning. She attended summer school in Bregenz, Austria, Florence, Italy and Madrid, Spain. She also traveled to Hawaii, Fiji, Tahiti, Australia and New Zealand.

She visited many other countries including France, Germany, the Low Countries, Scandinavia, Great Britain, 47 states in the

USA, and seven provinces in Canada.

### **World Polio Day is October 24**

In October, Highlands Mountaintop Rotary always celebrates the amazing accomplishments of the Polio Eradication Campaign that Rotary has been part of since 1988.

Since then, 3 billion children in 200 countries have been vaccinated against this dreaded disease that can cause paralysis in children and permanent disability though adulthood. The effort has reduced worldwide cases by 99.9%!

Most of us readily accepted our Polio vaccinations in childhood. Some of us are old enough to remember children in our neighborhood being stricken...playing kickball one day and paralyzed the next. We also remember the scary heart lung machines keeping people alive who could no longer breathe on their own. Later in life we remember those who developed post-polio syndrome and ended up disabled and in wheelchairs.

The USA has been free of polio for decades, but in 2021, a child presented in NY with paralysis, and tested positive for polio. A wastewater surveillance test in her area picked up multiple cases and the indications that the virus had been spreading for a while. An emergency effort to get unvaccinated children the polio vaccine was undertaken and the spread subsided.

Many children in America are unvacci-

nated, as in most countries, so although most of the world is technically Polio free, that could change at any time.

Without the Polio Eradication program worldwide, Polio would rage through the world again. In 1982, over 200,000 became paralyzed. We don't want that to EVER happen again.

So, we must support the effort, and each year at this time we ask those in the community and business world who are able and interested, to join our Mountaintop Rotary members in donating to this important program.

All donations are matched two times by Bill Gates and the Gates Foundation.

Last year the money Mountaintop Rotary raised enabled 24,000 children to be vaccinated.

Following the override of Senate Bill 747 in 2023, the NCSBE issued guidance that political parties could only appoint observers in races where they had a candidate explicitly on the ballot. Highlands has registered candidates from both parties.

According to the NCSBE, observers play an important role in making the voting process transparent to political parties and candidates. The observers witness the conduct of voting and can report any perceived issues to election officials or the party that appointed them.

In North Carolina three observers per political party are allowed on site for 4-hour stints

Observers must be appointed in advance by a county or state political party chair or by an unaffiliated candidate and they must wear a badge to identify their role.

Observers are allowed to take notes on electronic devices and witness procedures but must not interfere with voters or election officials. They can't question voters inside the polling place, make or receive phone calls, or get close enough to see how a voter marks a ballot. If an observer believes there is a problem, they must report it to the chief judge, the county board of elections, or the party that appointed them. They are not to interfere or challenge a voter directly. A chief judge can remove a disruptive observer after a verbal or written warning.

Observers are allowed to listen to conversations between a voter and election official that take place in the voting place, provided the conversation is related to election administration; move about the voting place, including the designated area for curbside voting; leave and reenter the voting enclosure; communicate via phone outside of the voting enclosure and witness any opening and closing procedures at the voting place.

Observers may not look at or photograph, videotape, or otherwise record the image of any voter's marked ballot; impede the ingress or egress of any voter into the voting place; inhibit or interfere with any election official in the performance of his or her duties, including interfering with the transport of sealed ballot boxes, election equipment, or election results to the county board of elections; engage in electioneering; or make or receive phone calls while in the voting place.

In North Carolina, designated poll ob-

servers can obtain lists of voters at least three times each day, with a minimum of one hour between each request. These lists contain the names of individuals who have already voted at that specific polling place.

These lists allow political parties to track which of their registered supporters have not yet voted. The parties can then contact those individuals to encourage them to go to the polls.

## All Mission Health Hospitals to host "Crush the Crisis" prescription drug 'Take Back Day'

Hospitals to partner with local law enforcement to encourage the safe disposal of unused or expired medication

All Mission Health hospitals will be hosting their annual "Crush the Crisis" prescription drug take back day to raise awareness about the dangers of prescription drug misuse and the importance of safe and proper disposal of unused or expired medications, on Saturday, Oct. 25.

The event, which coincides with the Drug Enforcement Administration's (DEA) National Prescription Drug Take Back Day, offers the community an opportunity to safely and anonymously dispose of medications that are no longer needed.

National drug overdose deaths decreased by nearly 27% in 2024, however, prescription drug misuse remains a public health crisis in the United States. Research shows a significant number of drug addictions and overdose deaths come from individuals accessing unused medications from family and friends.

Law enforcement officers will be onsite collecting: tablets, capsules and patches of Hydrocodone (Norco, Lortab, Vicodin), Oxycodone (Oxycontin, Percocet), Tramadol (Ultram), Codeine, Fentanyl

(Duragesic). Morphine. Hydromorphone (Dilaudid) and Oxymorphone (Opana). Ointments, lotions, drops, liquid medication (in leak-proof containers) and vape cartridges (without batteries) and pet medications will also be accepted.

Any medications are accepted; however, needles, syringes, lancets or liquids will not be accepted.

they are registered voters in Highlands they are eligible to hold the office and any vote cast for them will be counted.

According to the MC Board of Election, write-in candidates should make sure they meet the eligibility requirements to hold office; run an active campaign even without formal ballot access. They say to actively campaign to encourage voters to write your name on the ballot – correctly – by creating yard signs, flyers, and other promotional materials, using social media and your own website to promote your campaign, and by canvassing and speaking with voters directly.

Other suggestions: provide clear instructions to voters. Since your name won't be printed, you must instruct your supporters on how to properly write your name on the ballot. It must be spelled correctly, consider campaign finance requirements. If you raise or spend more than \$1,000 for your campaign, you are legally required to organize a candidate political committee and

file disclosure reports, contact the Macon County Board of Elections at (828) 349-2034 for specific information, guidelines, and confirmation that your votes will be counted.

On the Nov. 4 ballot there is a writein space for mayor, two write-in spaces for Commissioners Patterson and Pierson and a write-in space for Jim Tate.

The same write-in name can be entered for all or any of the four write-in spaces or a different write-in can be specified per category – mayor (1), Patterson/Pierson (2) or Tate (1).

According to Judy Fritts with the MC Board of Elections, and the NCSBE the person with the most votes – whether the candidate on the ballot or the write-in – will be elected.

Since there are two write-in spaces under Patterson and Pierson, if a write-in beats both of them, he or she can pick the seat they want to occupy.

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




### Is there a balm in Gilead?

To say that the weight of the world feels heavy this season would be a profound understatement. It seems like whenever you turn on the news, or search social media, or even check in with a friend we are met with more sadness, more devastation, and more grief. And so, in recognizing this reality, like most pastors do, I turned to scripture. Jeremiah 8:22 to be exact. This is the same passage that inspired the beloved hymn "there is a balm in Gilead." However, in scripture, the prophet poses it as a question "is there no balm in Gilead?" Well, there's good reason for this creative rewrite.

The song is one of the most well-known spirituals rooted in the African American experience of slavery in the 18th and 19th century. And though it was primarily born of oppression, its fundamental design was to serve as a means of comfort among enslaved African Americans. Taking the question mark out and reconfiguring the sentence as a declarative fosters a sense of comfort, hope, and restoration. This is what African American theologian Howard Thurman refers to as "a creative triumph."

The church is called to be bearers of a new creative triumph as we carry on during these challenging times we are living in. And we can do this by not only weeping for our nation but committing ourselves to being the balm for one another. Many places will welcome your achievements, your appearances, your happiness, or your transactions. But the church is called to be different. The church is called to be a community of faith that is committed not to judging, but to growing. These are particularly challenging times we are living in. But yet, our calling remains the same. To love God. To love one another. To grow together in that love. To pay attention to what surrounds us - while staying focused on who we are called to be in the world. So that we can grow in compassion, in hope, in our faith, and find our belonging to God and to one another.

So, I ask you, readers, what will your creative triumph be?

As followers of Jesus Christ, we trust that there is a balm in Gilead! It is made of love, God's love in Jesus Christ that does not abandon us but experiences the loss and grief of the world with us. Love that will never let us go, love that lives and heals and restores in simple, miraculous acts of human kindness. Love that comforts us in ways that are unexpected. Love that is unconditional and transformational. Love that is Good News. And that good news comes to us in the form of a healing balm. And we trust that it can and will heal the sin-sick soul.
